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Black in STEM: Spotlight on Prof. Christopher Jackson

Today, we're highlighting the work of Equinor Professor Christopher Jackson from Imperial College London.

Christopher is a geologist whose research covers tectono-stratigraphic evolution of rift basins, salt tectonics and deep-water sedimentology and

stratigraphy. After completing his BSc and PhD in Geology and rift basin evolution at Manchester, Christopher went on to work at Norsk Hydro in Norway, where he also tried out ice-climbing, sea kayaking and rock climbing before taking on the full-time role of Lecturer at Imperial. Today's key figure from Black British history is [Dr Harold Moody](#). Born in Jamaica, Harold moved to Britain in 1904 and studied medicine at King's College, London in 1912. Due to racial prejudice his potential employers did not want to hire a Black man, so he set up his own GP, establishing a practice in King's Grove, Peckham, in 1913.

In 1931, Harold formed the [League of Coloured Peoples](#) (LCP) with assistance from Charles Wesley, a visiting history professor, educator, and author from America. The LCP's aims were possibly Britain's first anti-racism campaign in the 20th century.
