## LGBTQ+ in STEM: Spotlight on David K. Smith

Today, we're highlighting the work of Prof. David K. Smith, a chemist at the University of York.

David's research work focusses on nanochemistry and utilising supramolecular chemistry to produce selfassembling nanostructures. He completed his PhD at the University of Oxford in 1996, then was awarded a fellowship from the Royal Society before moving to the University of York in 1999.

Since then, David has won numerous accolades not only for his research work,

but also for his teaching, outreach, and advocacy of diversity in STEM.

David came out as gay in 2002, and is now a promoter of diversity and inclusivity in chemistry, at York, and in STEM in general. He has written articles, given talks, and been interviewed on the importance of visibility for the LGBTQ+ community in STEM.

Today's key figure in British LGBTQ+ history is <u>Antony Grey</u>, hailed by the Guardian as "arguably the most important British gay rights campaigner of the 20<sup>th</sup> century".

Born Antony Edgar Gartside Wright in 1927, he <u>adopted his pseudonym</u> after his mother requested he not embarrass his family with his campaigning. He worked for the Homosexual Law Reform Society and the Albany Trust for decades, with his lobbying efforts leading to the passing of the <u>Sexual Offences Act of 1967</u>, partially decriminalising homosexual acts. For work such as this, Antony was awarded the Pink Paper's Lifetime Achievement Award in 1995, and was named <u>Stonewall Hero of the Year in 2007</u>.
